Subject: Fast Track entries and other revisions included in the February

2016 release of RDA Toolkit

The Fast Track process is used for addition of terms and definitions to the glossary, addition of references, clarification in wording, etc. The possible changes are discussed by the RDA Steering Committee (RSC) members, not by the RSC communities. If an RSC member thinks a possible change should be discussed by the RSC communities, the entry for that change is removed from the Fast Track process.

Listed below are (1) the Fast Track changes approved by the RSC, (2) changes to examples, (3) revisions for editorial consistency, (4) corrections of errors reported since the October 2015 release of RDA Toolkit, and (5) some changes discussed during and after the November 2015 JSC meeting.

The changes and corrections in this document will appear in the February 2016 release of RDA Toolkit. Generally, strikeout is used to show deletions and double underlining is used to show additions. For some corrections, only a clean-copy version is shown with an explanation of what was corrected.

Usually found as "closed captions" which are encoded and must be decoded (switched on) to be made visible. There are also "open captions" which are always visible and cannot be turned off. Excludes subtitles in a language different from the spoken content.

A base material consisting of a type of stiff pasteboard sheet that is thicker than 0.006 inches, typically consisting made of good-quality chemical pulp or rag pasteboard pulp, and varying greatly in type and stability strength, and that is thicker than 0.006 inches.

Glossary, deletion of "data type":

The direct reference method (i.e., the system of objects) used to represent geospatial information in an electronic resource (e.g., raster, vector, point).

Glossary, revision of "disc master" to delete quotation marks enclosing "father" as shown below:

Disc master: Generation designation for an audio recording comprising a negative metal copy of a recording cut (typically) onto a lacquer-coated disc by means of a disc lathe; the lacquer original is destroyed in the process. The term master can also apply to the lacquer original if it has not been used to create a metal father.

Glossary, revision of "double leaf":

A leaf of double size <u>relative to the rest of the resource</u>, folded in half at the foreedge or top edge, with the fold uncut and no printing inside the fold, and typically <u>bound at the inner margin</u> with a fold at the fore edge or at the top edge of the <u>resource</u>.

Glossary, revision of "embossed":

A production method for tactile resources using either a metal or plastic sheet as a master or embossing equipment (often in combination with a computer and specialized software) to produce braille and Moon copies. Use for "plate copy" or "press braille" or braille generated using Braillo equipment. Also use for "dotty Moon" (where the Moon characters are embossed as lines of dots), including use of Tiger Embosser equipment.

Glossary, revision of "engraving":

A production method consisting of creating marks on the surface of a hard material, such as metal or glass, by incising with a sharp tool. In printing, the intaglio process in which the design is incised into a printing plate, usually a flat copper plate, with the aid of a graver or burin that is held in the palm of the hand and pushed against the copper to cut lines comprising V-shaped grooves. The plate is then inked up, wiped so that ink is retained in the grooves and then forced out under the pressure of the printing process to create lines on the paper. The technique was first developed in the early 15th century in Germany. Historically, "engraving" has sometimes been used incorrectly to refer to all printmaking processes, particularly any process employing printing plates.

2. An illustrative content consisting of an exact copy of an original, usually in the same dimensions as the original, especially of books, documents, prints, and
